Aims

Our School Uniform is important to us. It is one way in which we identify ourselves as a school family and it promotes a strong, cohesive school identity which supports high standards and expectations in all areas of school life. It promotes harmony between different groups represented in the school, and it enhances security, assisting the school to identify individual pupils (particularly on external visits) in order to maintain good order and identify anyone not part of our school more easily.

We also believe that school uniform prevents the inevitable loss of self-esteem caused to individual children should a family not be able or willing to provide the newest, most expensive or fashionable clothing and equipment.

The Governors at Ainderby Steeple CE Primary School will respect variations to our school uniform if they are directly related to established religious or cultural traditions. However, any variations will be dealt with on an individual basis and judgements will remain at the discretion of the Head Teacher and the Governing Body. Smartness and high standards of appearance are expected at all times.

Uniform

In order to maintain a strong sense of identity and belonging within our school, we require all pupils to wear school uniform which consists of;

- Grey/black skirt or pinafore dress of appropriate length
- Grey/black trousers - long or short (no jeans or leggings)
- Royal blue sweatshirt or cardigan with or without logo
- Pale blue or white shirt/polo-shirt
- Black, grey, navy or white socks/tights
- Sun hat in the summer
- Blue and white checked summer dresses/skirts/tops
- Hats/gloves etc in the winter

A school fleece and shower-proof jacket with the school logo are optional and can be purchased along with all uniform from www.school-shop.co.uk Children need a coat of some kind in school since they go outside regularly and weather can be unpredictable.

Footwear

- Black, flat, sensible shoes (Not trainers for everyday wear)
- Winter footwear - children may wear flat, black/brown boots. In snowy weather all children are encouraged to wear wellington boots and to bring a clothes peg to clip them together or a bag to keep them in. They must have a change of footwear such as plimsolls, school shoes or slippers to wear inside school to prevent the floors from becoming slippery and wet.
- Summer footwear - appropriate fitted plain sandals with a back strap or winter school shoes may be worn. 'Croc' sandals with the adjustable heel strap, are not considered suitable footwear for school for health and safety reasons.

If your child is unable to tie shoe laces please ensure they do not have shoes/trainers which lace up.

P.E. and Games Kit

For health and safety reasons, it is essential that children are dressed appropriately for any physical activity. All long hair should be tied back. Appropriate footwear is essential: trainers for outside wear and plimsolls or bare feet for indoor PE.

- Boys and girls wear black or navy shorts
- Plain white t-shirt
- black plimsolls for indoor PE, trainers for outdoor PE.
- Plain dark colour tracksuits can be worn in colder weather.

This should all be kept in a named drawstring shoe bag. The kit should be kept in school and taken home at the end of each half term to be washed.

ALL ITEMS OF CLOTHING AND SHOES MUST BE IDENTIFIED WITH THE CHILD'S NAME SO WE CAN RETURN ANY THAT GETS LOST.

Swimming Kit

All long hair must be tied back.

Children need:

- a towel
- swimming trunks or costume, (goggles if used)
- brush or comb, carried in a waterproof bag.

Jewellery

The wearing of jewellery for either girls or boys is not allowed, especially as individuals become very upset if a treasured piece of jewellery goes missing. If a pupil has pierced ears, plain studs should only be worn for health and safety reasons and must be removed or covered with a plaster (provided from home) during all PE activities.

Watches may be worn to school, however they must be removed before any PE lessons.

Please note that the school will be unable to take any responsibility for any jewellery brought to school which is lost.

Role of the Headteacher and Governing Body

- The Headteacher will ensure that pupils comply with the uniform policy agreed by the Governing Body.
- The Headteacher has a duty to enforce the school uniform throughout the school community, as part of the duty within maintenance of day to day discipline in the school.
- The Governing Body will be receptive to any reasonable complaint from parents or carers concerning uniform and will handle it respectfully, considering fully the issues raised. The Governing Body will aim to work with parents to arrive at a mutually acceptable outcome.
- The Headteacher and Governing body will ensure best value for money and good quality when appointing suppliers.

Role of the Parents/Guardians

- To ensure that their child / children adhere to the school's uniform policy.
- Ensure that they come to school in uniform everyday unless there are special circumstances such as Christmas parties or charity fund raising.
- Parents and carers should raise any complaints about the school uniform and dress codes with the Governors following the schools complaints procedure.
- Parents will contact school if there is a genuine reason why their child is not wearing the school uniform so that it can be discussed.

Racial Equality & Equal Opportunities

All children have equal access to wearing school uniform regardless of their culture, race, religion, gender, disability or ability. We ensure that the set uniform respects other policies such as equality and diversity and allows for individual sets of circumstances of all groups and individuals. Ainderby Steeple CE Primary School is committed to creating a positive climate that will enable everyone to work free from racial intimidation and harassment and to achieve their full potential.

Non-Compliance with the School Uniform Policy

The head teacher, or a person authorised by the head teacher, may ask a pupil to go home briefly to remedy a breach of the school's rules on appearance or uniform. When making this decision school will consider the child's age and vulnerability, the ease and time it will take, and the availability of the child's parents. This is not an exclusion but an authorised absence. However, if the pupil continues to breach uniform rules in such a way as to be sent home to avoid school, or takes longer than is strictly necessary to effect the change, the pupil's absence may be counted as an unauthorised absence. In either case the pupil's parents will be notified and the absence recorded.
